





Loads and measurements

Calculation principles

- Calculation principles are based on real measurements of the installations, for which the simulation models are built.
- Simulations are built on the average model of the drives, which gives us a very good estimation of the realistic compensation needs.
- This includes the design of the drive at component level and behavior. Loading of the drives is assumed to be at 80% capacity.

Calculation principles AC/DC chokes


- This calculator uses the DC chokes on the drive as the main component instead of the AC chokes.
- Generally, this is the "state-of-the-art" solution for small and medium-sized drives.
- It is possible to add an additional reactor in front of the drives to reduce the drive's Total Harmonic Distortion (THD) values, as well as to dampen down the amplification factor.
- DC chokes have a higher amplification factor and higher THD values of the two choices.





Calculation principles – Amplification factor


- When harmonic currents are compensated from the system, the harmonics are decoupled from the system impedance seen in the picture below.
- Now all the harmonics are seen between the drive and the filtering solution. (Includes active and passive compensation.)
- As the impedance reduces the rate at which current is changing, decoupling the system impedance from the system increases the harmonics on the drives.





Calculation principles – Amplification factor

- For this reason, it is important to include all the loads on the calculator.
- When the fundamental current is higher, the amount of harmonic current that needs to be compensated to reach certain TDD values is smaller, and a lower amplification factor is included.
- When the target is for example 8% of TDD, some harmonics are still flowing through system impedance and the amplification factor is lower!
- This way, the initial and operation cost of the system is minimized.





Cost-effective solution

- As we reach the target TDD value, we are making sure we are not compensating more harmonics than necessary.
- The initial cost of the system is lower when we are not oversizing the project.
- Less compensation current means a lower amplification factor, which means less overall system size. – Lowest possible operation cost!
- AFE (Active Front End) systems THDi levels are always aimed for the lowest possible value. – Higher operation cost, more losses introduced!







Deep dive – Why DC chokes have higher THD values?

- DC chokes will reduce the harmonics during current conducting in phases but do not reduce the harmonics in the commutation process between the phases
- When the commutation is changing from phase L1 to L2, the harmonics in L2 are not flowing through the drive impedance and higher THD values can be seen in the front of the drive.

Commutation from L1 to L2




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
DC choke
